Striking a Balance

An outgrowth of the HCPC's Planning For Prosperity initiative, the on-going forum series started in 2004.

A rapid increase in demand for subdivided property in Hancock County spurred the creation of this series. Organizers hope that the series will lead to:

- ✓ Increased Awareness of Subdivision Review Standards and Other Applicable State Regulations
- ✓ Greater Understanding of the Importance of Regional Water Resource Management
- ✓ Implementation of Planning Tools & Wise Development Practices
- ✓ Constructive Dialogue Among Municipal Officials, Conservation Groups and Those in the Development & Construction Industry
- ✓ Better Development Tracking at the Municipal and County Level

Did you know:

- Registration of Farmland Act (Title 7, Chapter 2-B) authorizes farmers to apply at any time to prohibit "incompatible use" within 50 feet of registered farmland, and to ensure that buyers are alerted when purchasing property that abuts registered farmland.
- The most recent (2007) USDA Census indicated that there were 386 farms in Hancock County and 52,749 acres of farmland.
- The estimated value of agriculture sales in Hancock County is about \$30.4 million per annum. The county has the fifth highest value of sales in the state.
- In 2011, there were 5,419 acres in Hancock County enrolled in the farmland taxation program, about 10 percent of total reported farmland.
